The following is a summation of today's discussion which was initiated following my observations so far this session.

As lobbyist for KCPR and KARSP, I have been to the Capitol 17 times. I also traveled to Wichita to speak to their KARSP unit. All this travel has happened since the 5th of January. During that time, I have attended numerous committee meetings and testified 5 times as well as contacting numerous legislators, on both sides of the aisle, and in both the Kansas Senate and House. I

He served in the United States Army for a period of 30 years. During his tenure, he commanded at every level from platoon through Brigade, serving a total of 13 years overseas, which included operational deployments to Afghanistan, Iraq, Kosovo, and Bosnia. As a Cavalry Squadron Commander, COL Clark deployed the first Stryker Brigade Cavalry Squadron into Afghanistan as part of Operation Enduring Freedom. Bill retired from the Army in 2014, culminating his military career as the Garrison Commander Fort Riley.

COL Clark's awards include the Region of Merit and two Bronze Stars. Upon retiring, Bill served as the Chief Operating Officer for USD 475, Geary County Schools in Junction City, for 3 years assuming his role as the President of St. John's Military School in Salina, KS. Upon the merger of St. John's with Saint Francis Ministries, Bill initially served as the organization's Chief of Staff before assuming his current role as President/CEO in November 2019.

Bill holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Business Management from the University of Maryland and a Master's Degree in Administration from Central Michigan University. He has been married to Andrea for thirty years; together they have four children and eight grandchildren. All of Clark's four children have, or are currently, serving in the military.

obviously have had numerous discussions with other lobbyists as well. Four of those serve on the KCPR Steering Committee with me. The consensus of those discussions and listening sessions are as follows:

- 1. There is much interest in a COLA, improving Tier III, and at least temporarily reducing the Working After Retirement restrictions. There additionally has been a push to bring the Corrections Officers, all police and fire, and 'sworn' members of the 'Fish and Game' law enforcement wing into KP&F. (Again, I will reiterate that this is across party lines and both the Senate and the House.) Because of their failed status, these subjects would need to come up as amendments and are no longer viable bills. Best described as "in limbo."
- 2. The common thread of these positive thoughts regarding our needs, I perceive, are being driven by the following main reasons:
 - A. The fact that you have been pounding them with your "cards and letters" is apparent and working, but just not on the right people!
 - B. Difficulty of drawing folks not only to the teaching profession but to many other areas of State Government as well.
 - C. Universal recognition that Tier III is "terrible" (the term I most often hear).
 - D. Employees in the "physical professions" (corrections officers, police and fire) are being asked to work too long before retirement.
 - E. Neighboring states are paying bonuses to draw employees - especially across state lines. Bonuses are not authorized in

Kansas for State Employees.

F. Working after retirement restrictions are too restrictive.

WHAT CAN I DO?

- 1. Continue writing the representative who is supposed to represent you, not the interests of leadership. Twenty-six years is enough!!
- 2. At this point, it is apparent that you need to get 3 fellow state employees or retirees to write as well.
- 3. Write the Governor and request/demand a benefit increase. Suggest she include it in her next budget!!
- 4. To Contact Her by email, go to governor. kansas.gov/questions_form/ This address will allow you to contact her by email.

- 6. If you should happen to mention that you heard that there was a bill for legislative pay increase in the hopper, while your interests have been thrown out, no one on the KCPR Steering Committee would think ill of you!

LONG TERM CARE - THE GORILLA IN THE ROOM



We're Living Longer, but ...
Advancements in medical science
have resulted in steadily increasing life
expectancy. But as we age, our health
problems become chronic as we suffer from

- Mental Model: Cognitive Impairment refers to the deterioration or loss of your intellectual capacity, as evidenced by memory loss, disorientation and/or the

- inability to reason. It is often caused by Alzheimer's disease or similar forms of senility or irreversible dementia.
- Medical Model: The medical model is often referred to as "medically necessary" care and/or due to "injury or sickness". In this context, long-term care should not be confused with short-term, restorative in nature acute care.

Will you lose the ability to function independently at some point in your life? Start planning for LTC now; you only have a 7/10 chance on needing LTC in your lifetime. KARSP has discounted rates on programs through AMBA. AMBA represents 63 different retired educator and school personnel associations in 36 states.
